The Power in Your Seed

The seed you plant carries inherent power and potential. Just as a physical seed contains the blueprint for a new plant, the promises of God within His Word hold the power to transform our lives and circumstances.

The Law of the Seed

1. Sowing and Reaping: The Law of the Seed is based on the principle that what you sow, you will reap (Galatians 6:7). 4. Generational Impact: The seeds we plant can have a lasting impact not just in our lives but also in the lives of future generations. Just as a tree grows from a single seed, the faith and promises we instill in our children and those around us can continue to bear fruit long after we are gone.

5. Supernatural Surprises: The seed you sow in good soil will bring about supernatural surprises. The Hebrew word for “supernatural” is מַעַל (me’al), meaning “above” or “beyond,” indicating that it transcends the ordinary. The Greek word for “supernatural” is παρα φύσιν (para physin), meaning “beyond nature.” The word for “surprise” in

Hebrew is הַפְתָּא (hapta'ah), meaning “unexpected event.” In Greek, it is ἐκπληξι (ekplixi), meaning “astonishment” or “shock.”

Examples of Men and Women in the Old Testament Who Sowed and Reaped Supernatural Surprises

1. Abraham: When he obeyed God and left his homeland, he was promised to be the father of many nations (Genesis 12:1-3). His faith and obedience led to the miraculous birth of Isaac, despite his old age.
2. Joseph: Sold into slavery by his brothers, Joseph remained faithful to God. His ability to interpret dreams led him to become the second most powerful man in Egypt, ultimately saving his family during a famine (Genesis 41).
3. Moses: When Moses obeyed God to lead the Israelites out of Egypt, he witnessed the parting of the Red Sea (Exodus 14). His obedience resulted in miraculous deliverance for the entire nation.
4. Hannah: After years of barrenness, Hannah prayed earnestly for a child. God answered her prayer, and she gave birth to Samuel, who would become a great prophet (1 Samuel 1).
5. David: A shepherd boy who became king, David's

faith in God led him to defeat Goliath with just a sling and a stone (1 Samuel 17). His life was filled with supernatural encounters and victories.

6. Elijah: The prophet Elijah experienced numerous miracles, including the provision of food during a drought and the raising of the widow's son (1 Kings 17). His faith brought about the supernatural intervention of God.

7. Esther: As a Jewish queen in Persia, Esther's courage and faith led her to risk her life to save her people from destruction (Esther 4). Her actions resulted in a miraculous turnaround for the Jews.

The Importance of Sowing and Confessing

The act of sowing the Word of God into our lives is crucial. Just as a farmer sows seeds into the soil, we must actively speak and confess God's promises over our circumstances. This is an act of faith that aligns our hearts with God's truth.

Key Scriptures on Sowing and Confessing:
