Introduction

4. Ezekiel 11:16:

- “Therefore say, Thus saith the Lord God; Although I have cast them far off among the heathen, and although I have scattered them among the countries, yet will I be to them as a little sanctuary in the countries where they shall come.”

5. Zephaniah 3:12:

- “I will also leave in the midst of thee an afflicted and poor people, and they shall trust in the name of the Lord.”

Story of Elijah

- 1 Kings 19:9-18: After Elijah’s confrontation with

the prophets of Baal, he fled into the wilderness, fearing for his life. He felt alone and believed he was the only faithful one left. God reassured him by revealing that there were still 7,000 in Israel who had not bowed to Baal, demonstrating that even in times of great apostasy, a faithful remnant exists. This story emphasizes God's faithfulness to preserve a group of believers who uphold His truth.

The Elect

Definition of the Elect

Scriptural References

1. Matthew 24:22:

- “And except those days should be shortened, there should no flesh be saved: but for the elect’s sake those days shall be shortened.”

2. 1 Peter 1:2:

- “Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ: Grace unto you, and peace, be multiplied.”

3. 2 Thessalonians 2:13:

- “But we are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.”

2. Ephesians 5:25-27:

- “Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish.”

Scriptural References

2. Revelation 13:15:

- “And he had power to give life unto the image of the beast, that the image of the beast should both speak, and cause that as many as would not worship the image of the beast should be killed.”

- “And I saw the woman drunken with the blood of the saints, and with the blood of the martyrs of Jesus: and when I saw her, I wondered with great admiration.”

4. Revelation 20:4:

- “And I saw thrones, and they sat upon them, and judgment was given unto them: and I saw the souls of them that were beheaded for the witness of Jesus, and for the word of God, and which had not worshipped the beast, neither his image, neither had received his mark upon their foreheads, or in their hands; and they lived and reigned with Christ a thousand years.”

Story of Stephen

- Acts 7: Stephen, one of the first deacons, boldly preached the Gospel and recounted Israel’s history. His faithfulness led to his martyrdom, as he was stoned to death for proclaiming the truth. This story exemplifies the ultimate sacrifice made by some believers in the face of persecution.

Plot Expansion: The Martyrdom of Stephen

Imagine the scene of Stephen’s trial, where he stands before the Sanhedrin, filled with the Holy Spirit. As he recounts the history of Israel and boldly accuses them of resisting the Holy Spirit, the atmosphere becomes charged with tension. The crowd becomes enraged, and Stephen, looking up, sees the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of the Father. His final words echo with grace and forgiveness, mirroring Christ’s own words on the

cross. This powerful moment not only highlights the cost of discipleship but also serves as a catalyst for the spread of the Gospel, as Saul (later known as Paul) witnesses the event and is transformed by the message he initially opposed.

Overview of Christian Persecution Worldwide

1. Global Statistics on Christian Persecution:

- According to the 2023 World Watch List published by Open Doors, it is estimated that 360 million Christians experience high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith. This represents one in seven Christians worldwide.
- In 2022, 5,621 Christians were killed for their faith, while 4,542 were detained without trial and 2,110 churches were attacked or closed.
- The top 10 countries where Christians face the most persecution include:
 - North Korea
 - Afghanistan
 - Somalia
 - Libya
 - Yemen
 - Nigeria
 - Pakistan
 - Iran
 - India
 - Syria

2. Types of Persecution:

- Physical Violence: Many Christians face violence, including beatings, kidnappings, and killings, particularly in countries where extremist groups are active.
- Discrimination: Christians often encounter discrimination in employment, education, and access to services, particularly in predominantly Muslim countries.
- Legal Restrictions: In some nations, laws are in place that restrict religious freedom, making it difficult for Christians to worship openly or evangelize.
- Social Hostility: Christians may face hostility from their communities, leading to social ostracism or violence from family members or neighbors.

Stories of Persecution

1. North Korea:

- North Korea remains the most dangerous place for Christians. The regime views Christianity as a threat to its authority. Believers are often forced into labor camps, where they face harsh conditions and torture. Those discovered practicing their faith can be executed.

2. Nigeria:
