STEP OUT OF THE ORDINARY TO RECEIVE THE EXTRAORDINARY

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Principle

Be willing to do something out of the ordinary, and you will receive the extraordinary. Step out of the ordinary, and by faith, you will receive the extraordinary.

Old Testament Examples

- 1. Noah (Genesis 6-9):
- Ordinary Action: Noah built an ark in a time of disbelief and ridicule.
- Extraordinary Outcome: His faith preserved humanity and the animal kingdom through the flood.
- Reflection: Sometimes, God calls us to act in faith even when others doubt us. Are we willing to trust God's vision for our lives when it seems impossible?
- 2. Abraham (Genesis 12):
- Ordinary Action: Abraham left his homeland and family to follow God's call.
- Extraordinary Outcome: He became the father of many nations and a key figure in the faith.
- Reflection: Stepping out of our comfort zones can lead to blessings beyond our imagination. What is God asking you to leave behind to follow Him?

New Testament Examples

- 1. Peter Walking on Water (Matthew 14:22-33):
- Scripture Reference:

- "And Peter answered him and said, Lord, if it be thou, bid me come unto thee on the water. And he said, Come. And when Peter was come down out of the ship, he walked on the water, to go to Jesus." (Matthew 14:28-29 KJV)
- Ordinary Action: Peter stepped out of the boat during a storm to walk toward Jesus.
- Extraordinary Outcome: He walked on water until doubt caused him to sink.

- Reflection: Sometimes, we must be bold and persistent in our faith. What barriers do we need to overcome to reach Jesus?
- 3. The Blind Man (John 9:1-12):
- Ordinary Action: Jesus used mud to heal a blind man, instructing him to wash in the Pool of Siloam.
- Extraordinary Outcome: The man received his sight

and testified of Jesus.

• Reflection: God can use ordinary means to accomplish extraordinary results. Are we open to His methods, even if they seem unusual?

4. The Early Church (Acts 2):

- Ordinary Action: The disciples gathered in prayer, waiting for the Holy Spirit.
- Extraordinary Outcome: The Holy Spirit descended, and they preached with power, leading to the conversion of thousands.
- Reflection: Prayer and unity can lead to extraordinary moves of God. How can we seek the Holy Spirit's guidance in our lives?
- 5. Paul's Missionary Journeys (Acts 13-21):
- Ordinary Action: Paul traveled to spread the Gospel, facing persecution and hardship.
- Extraordinary Outcome: He established numerous churches and spread Christianity across the Roman Empire.
- Reflection: Following God's call may lead to challenges, but it can also result in significant impact. Are we willing to endure for the sake of the Gospel?

Historical Examples of Stepping Out of the Ordinary

1. Christopher Columbus:

Meanings of "Ordinary" and "Extraordinary"

Hebrew Meanings

Ordinary:
