"But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit."

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CHAPTER 1 Introduction

"מְחֲרֵכ דֶסָח" (Chesed ka-rehem)

Translation: "Mercy is like a womb" (where "no," (chesed) is another word for mercy that emphasizes loving-kindness).

In this context, you could express the broader concepts separately:

"תונושלב רוביד לש היארה םע שדוקה חורב םידלונ"

Translation: "Born by the Holy Spirit with the evidence of speaking in tongues."

When conveying the idea that mercy is akin to being nurtured and birthed through the Holy Spirit, it reflects the nurturing aspect of God's mercy in new life and spiritual renewal.

Together, you could summarize the concept like this: "The mercy of God, like a womb, nurtures us when we are born by the Holy Spirit, evidenced by speaking in tongues."
