This message resonated deeply, illuminating the dangers of pursuing superficiality over authenticity in our Apostolic Pentecostal Worship and Apostolic Pentecostal Preaching. The Lord Jesus Christ inspired me to write this book titled The Folly of Artificial in the Apostolic Pentecostal Church of our day and time. As we navigate the complexities of our Apostolic Pentecostal faith that was once delivered to the saints of God in a world increasingly characterized by artificial constructs.

Pentecostal movement Apostolic crossroads, with many being tempted like fish in a stream, drawn to shiny lures and artificial bait in the realms of Apostolic Pentecostal Worship and Apostolic Pentecostal Preaching. Instead of seeking a genuine word from the throne of God, we often encounter performances and professionalism designed to impress rather than to convey the burden of the Lord Jesus Christ. We witness "pretty boy preaching" filled with plastic performances, big words that few understand, and a lecture-style delivery of a Professor and a parrot at the same time that prioritizes knowledge over conviction and Acts 2:38 Salvation. Apostolic Pentecostal preaching of mercy and the grace of God which is the gift of the Holy Ghost with the evidence

of speaking in tongues with compassion and the love of God.

I come from the old school Apostolic Pentecost that's still up to date and on time for this hour. The real and genuine power of the Holy Ghost, the presence of God in a Apostolic Pentecostal Church, where seasoned Fivefold Ministers in the Apostolic Pentecostal Church would remind me that a message could be powerful without the need for excessive filler. Phrases like "come on, somebody, give me an amen." One elder once told me, "Just preach the word God gave you. If they say amen or praise the Lord, that's fine, but don't beg for it." This wisdom has shaped my understanding of authentic Apostolic Pentecostal Preaching, which should be rich in substance rather than reliant on gimmicks or catchy one-liners.

In the Apostolic Pentecostal church, we have the best preaching and Apostolic Pentecostal fivefold Preachers in the world—Seasoned Statesmen and Pulpiteers who are baptized in Jesus' name and filled with the Holy Ghost and fire, with the evidence of speaking in tongues. They preach under the anointing of the Holy Ghost, wielding Apostolic Pentecostal Authority and Power. However, we must be cautious of the Artificial performances that can infiltrate our platforms.

The Meaning of "Artificial"

Hebrew Meaning

In Hebrew, the concept of "artificial" can be represented by the term ישעם (me'usah), which means "made" or "manufactured." This term suggests something that is not natural or original, but rather created through human effort.

Also, in Hebrew, the term הרובעת (ta'avurah) can be interpreted as something that is not genuine or merely imitative. This word captures the essence of something constructed without the Apostolic Pentecostal Authenticity of the Power of the Holy Ghost and the Anointing of his inspiration or true Spiritual Substance.

Hebrew Idiom

In Hebrew idiomatic expressions, בזכה (hakzev), meaning falsehood or deception, warns against presenting a deceptive image, emphasizing the need for authenticity in spiritual matters.

Greek Meaning

In Greek, the word for "artificial" can be derived from άνθρώπινος (anthropinos), which means "human-made" or "of human origin," lacking divine authenticity. This term emphasizes that something is created or constructed by humans rather than occurring naturally or by divine intervention.

Another relevant term is τεχνητός (technitós), which translates to "artificial" or "manufactured." This word is related to τέχνη (téchnē), meaning "art" or "craft," indicating that artificiality involves skillful human intervention.

Metaphorical Meaning

In worship and Apostolic Pentecostal preaching, artificiality can manifest as performances and professionalism that prioritize style over the the power of the Holy Ghost, drawing attention to the performer rather than to the Lord Jesus Christ, the one True God. Metaphorically, "artificial" signifies a façade or an imitation that lacks the depth or essence of the original. It may refer to:

- Superficiality: Something that appears pleasing on the surface but lacks substance.
- Deception: A representation that misleads or fails to convey true feelings or intentions.

For example, in a spiritual context, artificial worship might refer to performances that seem vibrant but lack genuine connection to God.

However, many services have devolved into emotional hype from the music experiences, devoid of true Apostolic Pentecostal spiritual power in

our authentic Apostolic Pentecostal worship out of an Apostolic Pentecostal experience of the new birth (of the water and the spirit). The heart of our worship is all about the One God and his Name is the Lord Jesus Christ who is the one seated upon the throne.

We don't worship a trinity and we should never ever sing a K-Love trinitarian song in an Apostolic Pentecostal Church. All of our songs should be christological. All of our songs should be about the Lord Jesus Christ and, by the way, we need to start singing some of those old Apostolic Pentecostal hymns. I'm tired of singing these songs that you don't even know what they're singing. Killing the services all these camp meetings and if that's what you want to be, then, go to a trinitarian church.

I came out of the trinitarian church to the truth of one God and I like the Apostolic Pentecostal chorus' and hymns. There are even some new Apostolic Pentecostal songs that have the right recipe, the tase and the flavor and the sound of Apostolic Pentecostal music. I don't want artificial meat and artificial sugar and artificial butter etc. Give me the real thing! The emphasis on talent and performance can overshadow the need for genuine Apostolic Pentecostal worship rooted in the Holy Ghost and fire.

The Call for Apostolic Pentecostal Authenticity

The Apostolic Pentecostal movement has a rich heritage of powerful Apostolic Pentecostal Peaching and worship led by individuals genuinely filled with the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in tongues. However, the trend of artificiality threatens this legacy. We must return to a place of Apostolic Pentecostal Authenticity, where Apostolic Pentecostal Preachers and Worship Leaders are not only skilled but also deeply committed to living out their faith.
