The Importance of Tithing and Offerings

Pay Your Tithes to Your Pastor and Give Offerings to the Storehouse

• Malachi 3:7-10: "Return to me, and I will return to you," says the Lord Almighty. "But you ask, 'How are we to return?' Will a mere mortal rob God? Yet you rob me. But you ask, 'How are we robbing you?' In tithes and offerings. You are under a curse—your whole nation—because you are robbing me. Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it." Fables, Analogies, and Metaphorical Meanings

Fable of the Farmer and the Seed:Once, there was a farmer who had a small plot of land. He had a handful of seeds that he hesitated to plant because he feared they might not grow. One day, he met an old wise man who told him, "If you keep the seeds in your hand, they will never bear fruit. But if you plant them in the soil, they will multiply beyond your imagination." The farmer decided to plant the seeds, and soon his field was overflowing with crops.

Analogy: Our hands can be likened to a garden. When we hold on tightly to our resources, they remain barren. But when we open our hands to give, we cultivate a garden of blessings that can flourish and bear fruit.

Poetic Meaning: Open hands are like open skies,Where blessings rain down from above.With every seed of faith we sow,We harvest joy, we harvest love.

Metaphorical Meaning: Opening our hands symbolizes letting go of control and trusting in God's provision. It is a gesture of faith that allows us to receive the abundance He has in store for us. Just as a tree cannot grow without releasing its seeds, we cannot experience the fullness of God's blessings without first letting go.

Rabbi Commentary on Open Heaven (Malachi 3:7-10)

In Jewish tradition, the concept of "open heaven" is rich with meaning. The phrase signifies a divine favor that allows blessings to flow freely to those who obey God's commands. Rabbis teach that returning to God through acts of obedience, such as tithing, creates a channel for His blessings to pour into our lives.

Rabbi Commentary:Rabbi Nachman of Breslov emphasized that the act of giving is not merely a financial transaction but a spiritual one. When we bring our tithes to God, we are acknowledging His sovereignty over our lives and finances. This act of faith opens the heavens, allowing God's blessings to flow like a river.

The "floodgates of heaven" represent an abundance that surpasses our understanding. It is a divine promise that when we trust God with our resources, He will respond with generosity that fills every need.

The Rebuking of the Devourer

Understanding the Devourer:In Malachi 3:11, God promises to "rebuke the devourer" for those who

faithfully tithe. The devourer symbolizes anything that consumes our resources—be it financial struggles, health issues, or personal crises.

Significance:By tithing, we not only open our hands to receive blessings but also invite God to protect our resources from being consumed by the devourer. This promise signifies that God will intervene in our lives, ensuring that our investments—whether in finances, relationships, or health—are safeguarded against loss.

Rabbi Commentary:Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach taught that the devourer is not just an external force but can also represent our own fears and anxieties that eat away at our peace and stability. By trusting God through tithing, we declare that we are not governed by fear but by faith. This act of faith empowers us to overcome the devourer, allowing us to live in the fullness of God's provision.

The Biblical Foundation

1. The Widow's Offering (Mark 12:41-44):

• Scripture: Jesus observed the rich giving their gifts at the temple, but He focused on a poor widow who gave two small coins. He declared, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others." • Significance: The widow opened her hands, trusting God with her last resources. In doing so, she demonstrated that true generosity is not about the amount given but the heart behind the gift.

2. The Feeding of the 5,000 (John 6:9):

• Scripture: A boy offered his five loaves and two fish to Jesus. Jesus took the food, gave thanks, and distributed it to the crowds, resulting in a miraculous feast.

• Significance: The boy's willingness to open his hands and share what little he had allowed Jesus to multiply it. This story illustrates how God can take our small offerings and do great things with them.

3. The Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30):

• Scripture: In this parable, a master entrusts his servants with talents (money) before going on a journey. The servants who invested their talents were rewarded, while the one who buried his talent was reprimanded.

• Significance: This parable teaches us that when we open our hands to use what God has given us, we invite His blessings. Holding onto our resources out of fear leads to missed opportunities.

4. The Prayer of Jabez (1 Chronicles 4:10):

• Scripture: Jabez cried out to the God of Israel, "Oh, that You would bless me and enlarge my territory!"

• Significance: Jabez's prayer exemplifies the act of asking God to expand his influence and blessings. By opening his hands in prayer, he sought God's favor and provision.

5. The Rich Young Ruler (Mark 10:21-22):

• Scripture: Jesus looked at the young man and loved him, saying, "You lack one thing: go, sell all that you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." The young man went away sorrowful, for he had great possessions.

• Significance: This story illustrates the struggle of opening our hands to let go of earthly treasures. True discipleship requires a willingness to surrender what we hold dear.

Scriptures on Blessing and Prosperity

Significance: This passage underscores the principle of generosity and the assurance that God will bless us abundantly when we give with a cheerful heart.

7. Joshua 1:8:

• Scripture: "Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful."

• Significance: This verse connects meditation on God's Word and obedience to His commands with prosperity and success, emphasizing the importance of aligning our lives with His truth.

8. Psalm 1:1-3:

• Scripture: "Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers, but whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on his law day and night. That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither—whatever they do prospers."

• Significance: This passage illustrates the blessings that come from delighting in God's law and living a righteous life, leading to prosperity in all endeavors.

Practical Applications

1. Opening Our Hands in Prayer:

• Practice: When we pray, consider physically opening your hands as a gesture of surrender. This act symbolizes your willingness to let go of control and trust in God's provision.

Rabbi Commentary on Verbal Confidence

In Jewish tradition, the spoken word holds immense power. Rabbis often teach that words create reality; they can build or destroy, bless or curse. The Talmud states, "The world stands on three things: Torah, service, and deeds of loving-kindness." This teaching highlights the importance of verbal expressions whether through prayer, study, or acts of kindness as foundational to a life of faith.

Rabbi Nachman of Breslov emphasized the importance of speaking to God, encouraging believers to express their thoughts and feelings openly. He taught that verbalizing one's struggles and hopes brings clarity and connection to the Divine. This aligns with the biblical principle that "the mouth speaks what the heart is full of" (Matthew 12:34).

Verbal confidence is not merely about speaking; it is about aligning our words with God's truth. When we declare God's promises, we participate in the creative act of faith, shaping our reality in accordance with His will.
