Understanding the Concept of Expectation

Understanding the biblical concept of “expectation” can deepen our appreciation for its significance in our faith journey. Below are the Greek and Hebrew words related to “expectation,” along with their meanings and implications:

Greek Word for Expectation

Word: ἡ ἐλπίς (hē elpís)

Meaning: The Greek word “elpís” is commonly translated as “hope” or “expectation.” In the New Testament, it conveys a sense of confident expectation, trust, and anticipation regarding God’s promises. It is more than a wish; it embodies a firm assurance that God will fulfill His word.

Usage in Scripture:

- Romans 5:5: “And hope (elpís) does not put us to shame, because God’s love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.”
- Hebrews 11:1: “Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for (elpís), the conviction of things not seen.”

Hebrew Words for Expectation

1. Word: תִּקְוָה (tiqvah)

Meaning: The Hebrew word “tiqvah” translates to “hope” or “expectation.” It signifies a sense of waiting with anticipation and trust in God’s promises. The root of this word is related to the idea of a cord or a line, suggesting a connection or binding to something that is awaited.

Usage in Scripture:

- Jeremiah 29:11: “For I know the plans I have for you,” declares the Lord, “plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope (tiqvah) and a future.”

2. Word: חֲקָה (chakah)

Meaning: The Hebrew verb “chakah” means “to wait” or “to look for.” It conveys the idea of waiting in expectation, often used in the context of waiting for God’s intervention or help.

Usage in Scripture:

- Psalm 62:5: “Yes, my soul, find rest in God; my hope (tiqvah) comes from Him. Truly He is my rock and my salvation; He is my fortress, I will not be shaken.”

Implications for Expectation in Faith

- Active Engagement: Both the Greek and Hebrew concepts of expectation emphasize an active

engagement in faith. It's not a passive waiting but a confident assurance that God will act according to His promises.

- Trust in God's Character: Expectation is rooted in trust in God's character and faithfulness. It acknowledges that, despite current circumstances, God is at work and will fulfill His plans.
- Community Aspect: In both the Old and New Testaments, expectation is often shared within a community of believers, reinforcing the importance of collective faith and encouragement.

Conclusion

Incorporating the meanings of “expectation” from the original languages into our understanding enriches our faith. As we embrace the unexpected, let us do so with the confident hope (elpís) and anticipation (tiqvah) that God is always at work, ready to reveal His miraculous power in our lives.
