
UNSHAKABLE RESOLVE



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We must have an unshakable resolve. This phrase emphasizes the importance of steadfast determination and commitment, especially in the face of challenges.

Leaders in the Old Testament with Unshakable Resolve

- 1. Moses: Despite facing immense challenges, including leading the Israelites out of Egypt and through the wilderness, Moses remained resolute in his mission to fulfill God's plan.
- 2. Daniel: Daniel showed unshakable resolve by refusing to compromise his faith, even when faced with the threat of death in the lions' den.

In his final moments, he prayed to God for the strength to defeat his enemies, and with the help of a young lad who guided him to the pillars of the temple, Samson pulled them down, bringing about his own death and that of many Philistines. This story is found in Judges 16:28-30:

"Then Samson called to the Lord and said, 'O Lord God, please remember me and strengthen me just this once, O God, that I may be avenged on the Philistines for my two eyes.' And Samson grasped the two middle pillars on which the house rested, and he leaned his weight against them, his right hand on the one and his left hand on the other. And Samson said, 'Let me die with the Philistines.' Then he bowed with all his strength, and the house fell upon the lords and upon all the people who were in it. So the dead whom he killed at his death were more than those whom he had killed during his life."

Apostles of the New Testament with Unshakable Resolve

The Twelve Apostles

- 1. Peter: Crucified upside down in Rome.
- 2. James (son of Zebedee): Beheaded in Jerusalem.
- 3. John: Died of natural causes after being exiled to Patmos.
- 4. Andrew: Crucified on an X-shaped cross in Greece.
- 5. Philip: Tradition states he was martyred by crucifixion.
- 6. Bartholomew (Nathanael): Traditionally believed to have been flayed alive and then beheaded.
- 7. Matthew: Traditionally martyred in Ethiopia.
- 8. Thomas: Stabbed with a spear in India.
- 9. James (son of Alphaeus): Stoned to death.
- 10. Thaddeus (Jude): Martyred, possibly by being shot with arrows.

Paul's Trials and Unshakable Resolve

- Persecutions: Hebrew: ra'ah (ער) "evil" or "harm";
 Greek: di gmos (διωγμός) "persecution."
- Weariness and Pain: Hebrew: yag'ah (עגי) "to toil";
 Greek: kopos (κόπος) "labor" or "sorrow."

Agabus the Prophet

Agabus was a prophet in the early church who demonstrated unshakable resolve in delivering God's message. In Acts 21:10-14, he prophesied about Paul's impending imprisonment:

"While we were staying for many days, a prophet named Agabus came down from Judea. And coming to us, he took Paul's belt and bound his own feet and hands and said, 'Thus says the Holy Spirit: This is how the Jews at Jerusalem will bind the man who owns this belt and deliver him into the hands of the Gentiles.' When we heard this, we and the people there urged him not to go up to Jerusalem. Then Paul answered, 'What are you doing, weeping and breaking my heart? For I am ready not only to be imprisoned but even to die in Jerusalem for the name of the Lord Jesus.' And since he would not be persuaded, we ceased and said, 'Let the will of the Lord be done.'"

Paul's response illustrates his unshakable resolve to fulfill his mission, regardless of the dangers he faced.

Paul and the Snake Incident

In Acts 28:3-5, Paul was bitten by a snake while gathering firewood but displayed unshakable resolve by shaking it off into the fire without suffering harm:

"When Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks and put them on the fire, a viper came out because of the heat and fastened on his hand. When the native people saw the creature hanging from his hand, they said to one another, 'No doubt this man is a murderer. Though he has escaped from the sea, Justice has not allowed him to live.' He, however, shook off the creature into the fire and suffered no harm."

This incident further exemplifies Paul's unwavering faith and determination to continue his mission despite physical threats.

Stories of Unshakable Resolve in History

Historical Figures

1. Abraham Lincoln: Faced numerous failures and setbacks in his early political career but remained resolute in his vision to unite the nation during the Civil War, ultimately leading to the abolition of slavery.

Destiny

In Hebrew, the word for "destiny" can be translated as לרוג (pronounced: goral), which refers to fate or the predetermined course of events.

Greek Meanings

- Determination: Greek: αποφασιστικότητα (pronounced: apofasistikotita) - "decisiveness."
- Perseverance: Greek: υπομονή (pronounced: ypomon) - "patience" or "endurance."
- Destiny: Greek: μοίρα (pronounced: moira) "fate" or "lot."
