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Preface

He is not finished with you. The Author of life is still writing your story. This short Apostolic Pentecostal booklet is written to encourage your heart, call you to the apostolic plan of salvation (Acts 2:38), and to remind you that God restores what the enemy meant for harm. Creeds and denominations made by men have obscured the apostolic simplicity. Return to the name of Jesus, repentance, baptism, the Holy Spirit, and the restoration of the Fivefold ministry — and watch God rewrite your story.

Chapter 1 — The Apostolic Foundation

- One God revealed in Jesus Christ; the apostles proclaimed the name of Jesus as the only name for salvation (Acts 4:12).
- The apostolic plan: Repent, be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and receive the gift of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:38).
- Baptism is in the name of Jesus; the Holy Spirit is received by obedience and the laying on of hands with the evidence of speaking in tongues (Acts 8:14–17; 19:5–6).
- The Fivefold ministry (apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, teachers) equips the saints to maturity and mission (Ephesians 4:11–16).

Chapter 2 — Devotional: Not Done Yet

He is not done with me yet. When seasons close,
He writes a new chapter. When doors seem locked,
He opens them. He rewrites shame into testimony,
defeat into destiny. Hold fast: God is the God of the
impossible. Trust His pen.

Short Prayer

Lord Jesus, thank You that You are not finished with
me. Rewrite my past into purpose. Baptize me in Your
name, fill me with Your Spirit, and make me a vessel
of holiness and power. Amen.

Declarations to Speak Aloud

- He is not done with me yet.
- He is rewriting my story.
- I will repent and follow the apostolic plan of salvation.
- I will be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins.
- I will seek and receive the Holy Spirit with the evidence of speaking in tongues.
- God is able to do the impossible in my life.

Chapter 3 — The Apostolic Plan: How to Begin Again of water and spirit according to Acts 2:38

1. Repent — Turn from sin with godly sorrow and a new mind (Acts 2:38).
2. Confess Jesus as Lord — Acknowledge Jesus as the one true God and Savior (Romans 10:9–10; Acts 4:12).
3. Be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ — The apostolic baptism (Acts 2:38; Acts 10:48; Acts 19:5).
4. Seek the Holy Spirit — Pray, receive prayer, and the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in tongues (Acts 8:14–17; 19:6). The initial evidence is the Spirit’s witness, is always with speaking in other tongues (Acts 2:4; Acts 10:44–46).
5. Join and submit to apostolic, fivefold-led fellowship — For accountability, training, and mission (Ephesians 4:11–16).
6. Live holy — Both inward renewal and outward obedience (1 Peter 1:15–16; Romans 12:1–2).

Chapter 4 — Restored by God: Biblical Testimonies of “It’s Over — But He Rewrote My Story”

When life seemed finished, God intervened and rewrote the outcomes. These examples encourage and instruct us.

- Joseph — Sold into slavery, falsely accused, imprisoned; God exalted him to second in Egypt to save many (Genesis 37; 39–45). Scripture: Genesis 37; 41; 50:20.

- Moses — Felt inadequate and reluctant, thought his call impossible; God used him to deliver Israel (Exodus 3–4; Hebrews 11:24–29).
- Jonah — Ran from God, thought his mission was over in the belly of the fish; God redirected him to preach repentance and save Nineveh (Book of Jonah).
- Jeremiah — Persecuted and cast into a cistern; God preserved and sustained His prophet amid opposition (Jeremiah 38:6–13).
- Joseph (son of Jacob) — [already listed as Joseph — included once]
- David — Anointed as king, hunted and rejected; God raised him to the throne (1 Samuel 16–31; 2 Samuel).
- Elijah — Fell into despair and wanted to die; God ministered to him and renewed his mission (1 Kings 19).
- Samson — Bound, blinded, and imprisoned; in his final act God used him to defeat the Philistines (Judges 16).
- Daniel — Cast into the lions' den for faithfulness; God saved him and promoted him (Daniel 6).
- Job — Lost everything, thought life was over; God restored him with greater blessing (Book of Job).
- Peter — Denied the Lord and felt failure; Jesus restored and commissioned him (Luke 22:54–62; John 21).
- Paul (Saul) — Persecutor turned apostle, imprisoned and persecuted many times; God used

him to write much of the New Testament and spread the gospel to the Gentiles (Acts 9; Acts 21–28; his epistles).

- Stephen — Stoned to death, yet his witness unleashed the gospel beyond Jerusalem (Acts 7–8).
- Mary Magdalene and the women at the tomb — Grief turned to joy at the resurrection and encounter with the risen Lord (Luke 24; John 20).
- Hannah — Barren and broken, God gave her Samuel who became a great prophet (1 Samuel 1–2).
- Gideon — Considered the least, yet God used him to lead Israel to victory (Judges 6–7).
- Abraham & Sarah — Seemingly impossible promise fulfilled with Isaac in old age (Genesis 17–21).

Modern Example of Perseverance

- Nelson Mandela — 27 years imprisoned, later became president and a symbol of national restoration. His life encourages faith that God can bring noble outcomes from seasons of suffering.

Chapter 5 — Fivefold Apostolic Ministry: Recovery and Order

- Apostles: Sent ones who plant churches and provide oversight.
- Prophets: Hear and declare God's direction and correction.

- Evangelists: Carry the gospel to the lost.
- Pastors: Shepherd and care for the flock.
- Teachers: Ground the people in sound doctrine.

A restored Fivefold brings balance, accountability, mission, discipline, and maturity. Submit to genuine apostolic authority for correction and restoration.

Chapter 6 — Holiness — Within and Without

- Holiness is both inward transformation and outward conduct. Apostolic holiness calls for moral purity, separated living, and a life of worship.
- Practical holiness: daily prayer, Scripture, fasting, righteous speech, integrity, and service.

Chapter 7 — Practical Encouragements

- If you feel finished: repent, be baptized in Jesus' name, seek the Holy Spirit, and connect with apostolic leadership.
- Keep a testimony journal: record how God rewrites your pages.
- Practice regular declarations and praise: speak God's promises over your situation.
- Serve where you are: use gifts to bless others; God uses faithful service to restore destiny.

Closing Prayer

Heavenly Father, thank You that You are not finished with us. Rewrite our stories. Call us back to the apostolic plan: repentance, baptism in the name of Jesus Christ, and the infilling of Your Holy Spirit with the evidence of speaking in tongues. Raise up true apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers to shepherd and send us. Bring holiness, power, and revival. In Jesus' name. Amen.
